Background: The Administration is bringing forth the final draft of the Road Surfacing Policy for Council's review. As there were no changes from the April 28, 2013 Council meeting this represents the final revision. Upon approval, this policy will replace the existing policy.

ROAD SURFACING AND OTHER MAJOR PROJECTS – PRIORITY SETTING

EFFECTIVE DATE: August 26, 2003 **Revised date:** July 29, 2010, May 28, 2013

SECTION: Public Works

POLICY STATEMENT:

To guide administration in making recommendations to Council and to assist Council in determining road surfacing priorities in the County.

PROCEDURE:

- 1. The primary priority for the existing surfaced road network will be to the development of ban free road structures.
- 2. Typically, additional paved or surfaced road infrastructure development will only be expanded through funding partnerships such as: Provincial or Federal grant(s), third party funding (e.g. industry) or local improvement tax.
- 3. The maintenance overlays will be reflected on a priority list with a 3 year paving capital budget, as well as a 7 year forecast being used to assist in capital and financial planning.
- 4. Depending on the construction techniques utilized and the availability of funds, subgrade preparation work and surfacing work may occur in the same construction year.
- 5. All new asphalt surfaced road structures shall be constructed as to achieve a weight allowance minimum of 100% during ban season.
- 6. To assist in establishing a priority list the following factors will be considered.
 - Provides network links to areas of the municipality, between the Province's Provincial Highways and to other municipalities;
 - Provides for a fair distribution of paved surfaces throughout the settled or sparsely settled portions of the municipality;
 - Cost benefits of installing a paved surface as opposed to maintaining a highly used gravel road.
- 7. Notwithstanding other sections of this policy, council will also prioritize major projects that will be worked on as funds and opportunities present themselves. This list will include only paving projects or major grading/regravelling projects in more remote areas of the County.

To assist in planning and pursuing projects of this nature council will annually place approximately \$ 300,000 in the annual municipal budget. This money may be used for upgrades to these roads, for cost sharing with industry or the Provincial Government, or it may be placed in a reserve for future use.

Roads that may be eligible for funding under this program include:

- Red Deer River Access Road
- North Fork road
- O'Chiese Road
- Chungo Road
- Swan Lake Road
- Cutoff Creek Road
- 8. Construction standards will be established by Council on a recommendation from the Director, Public Works for each project through criteria set out in the Clearwater County Road Standards Policy. In determining these standards consideration will be given to the long term road utilization.

- * Peace Officer Fatality 1st recorded in CPO history Officers attended his memorial in High River.

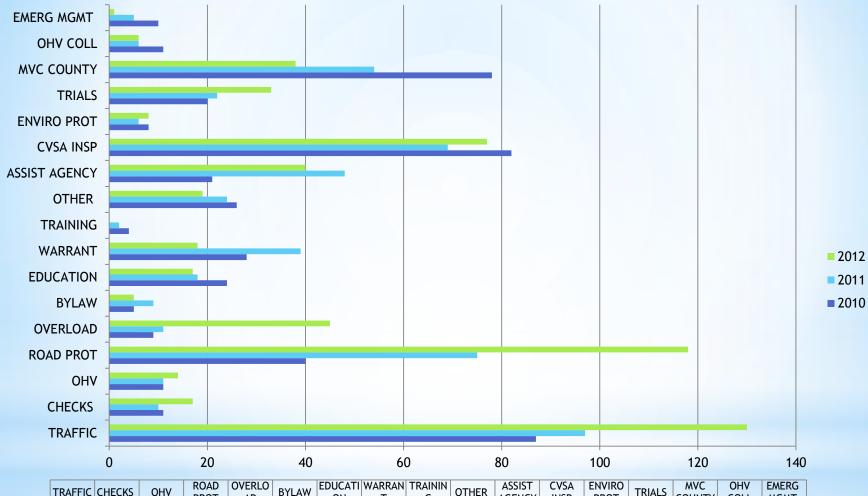

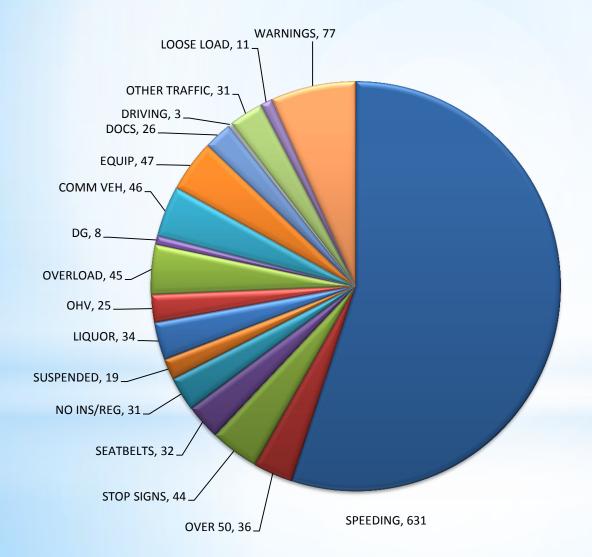

*Symmary of Jan - Rec 2012

- Increase in the number of overloads on our roads. 45 in 2012 compared to 17 in 2011.
- Speeding in excess of 50 kph over the posted speed limit has increased in 2012. Increasing problem on local roads and is also very noticeable on the primary highways. High speed for 2012 167 in a 80 zone.
- Off Highway vehicle complaints have been a problem during 2012. With the decline in enforcement presence working in the west part of the County our officers are seeing the number of complaints growing and frustration of the people with concerns increasing.
- County Officers have been getting very positive response from residents when out on the side by side. Patrols have been done in the South Fork, 752, Nordegg and Big Horn Dam areas.

- We continue go get a large number of Industry requests for safety presentations.
- Positive Ticket program (sponsored by Rocky Credit Union) ran from May to October and was very successful
- Vandalism and partying by young people at gravel pits.
- Court Orders 2 completed (1 cleanup & 1 abandoned house)
- Officers attending CCPAC and the Community Hall meetings. Very positive response noted from the Hall meetings. Officers were able to answer questions and address complaints from rate payers.
- Started working on Service Level Review of dept.

Background:

Staff wish to provide Council with a very general report regarding Nordegg Wildfire 015. As details are still being collected, staff is only wishing to inform Council at a high level and will submit a more comprehensive report to Council via the CREMA Committee once a full debriefing has taken place.

During the event the County's Emergency Operations Centre (EOC) was active from Thursday May 9th through into last week. At various times representatives from the County; RCMP; ESRD; CRFRS and TPR were present. The Emergency Operations Centre supported the on-scene Incident Command Post responders and dealt with evacuees, media and event related issues outside of the event site. Minister Diana McQueen also visited the County's reception centre and EOC for a briefing.

During this event the County utilized various mutual aid agreements as well as the assistance of the Provincial Operations Centre (POC – the Provincial EOC). Other resources were utilized both on site and in the County EOC.

On Sunday May 12th the County issued declared a State of Local Emergency and on the recommendation of ESRD conducted an evacuation of Nordegg. Residents were



evacuated until the following Friday when the fire status was changed to "Being Held". Staff would note that the status was changed again on the morning of Friday May 24th to "Under Control". Upon being allowed back into the hamlet, residents were still on a two hour evacuation notice.

Also on the morning of Friday May 24th the County lifted the evacuation notice and terminated the State of Local Emergency.

At this point in time the full cost of the event is not known, nor is it known if the event will qualify for Provincial Disaster Program funding. In addition to external resources (mutual aid, hired private sector resources) there will also be staff overtime costs for all staff working the event including managers, as per past practice and direction. A full cost total will be provided to Council at a later date.

Staff will be present to expand verbally on this report and answer questions that Council may have.

Background:

The Snowbirds will be in the area as part of the Rocky Air Show being held in July and the County has been asked to provide a letter or approval for the Snowbirds to operate at less than 1000 feet above ground level during their time in the area.

As a municipality, the County does not regulate air traffic as this is the jurisdiction of the Federal government. However, the Snowbirds themselves do require Council's approval to operate over communities at lower altitudes. This would include all activities such as arrival, practice, performing, media flights, etc.

Background:

At their regular meeting on April 9th, Council discussed the changes that have occurred to the Municipal Recreation/Tourism Areas (MRTA) Grant as a result of decreased Provincial funding. As Council is aware, the County has typically applied for funding on behalf of three campgrounds within the County: Cow Lake, Burnstick Lake and Open Creek Dam, since the County holds the recreation leases.

Under the criteria, Cow Lake is the only campground eligible for funding in 2013, and under the new Provincial Budget, the grant amount has been reduced by 50% to \$4000. The grant program is slated to end and cease funding entirely on March 31, 2014.

Through discussions with Cow Lake Campground on the anticipated effects of these changes, it was indicated to County Staff that 90%-95% of the time since the campground utilized the grant, the typical \$8000 has been very useful for the

campground during the initial months of the camping season. Cow Lake Campground was late with their application several years ago, so they utilize funding from the previous year. Therefore, this year the campground will use the \$8000 they received in 2012 as a start-up fund for the 2013 camping season. Prior to this trend, the campground's operator would run a deficit either until camping started to pick up, or until the grant funding arrived. At this point in time, it is difficult to predict how the program's changes will affect the campground, given that the effects will not be felt for another year.

Open Creek Dam has some remaining dollars from the MR/TA Grant they will be utilizing for the upcoming camping season as well. According to the campground's operator, they have been doing well the last 5-6 years and were able to perform some renovations with the MR/TA grant in the past. Similar to Cow Lake, at this point in time it is difficult to predict what effects the loss of the grant program will have. Burnstick Lake shared the same sentiment.
