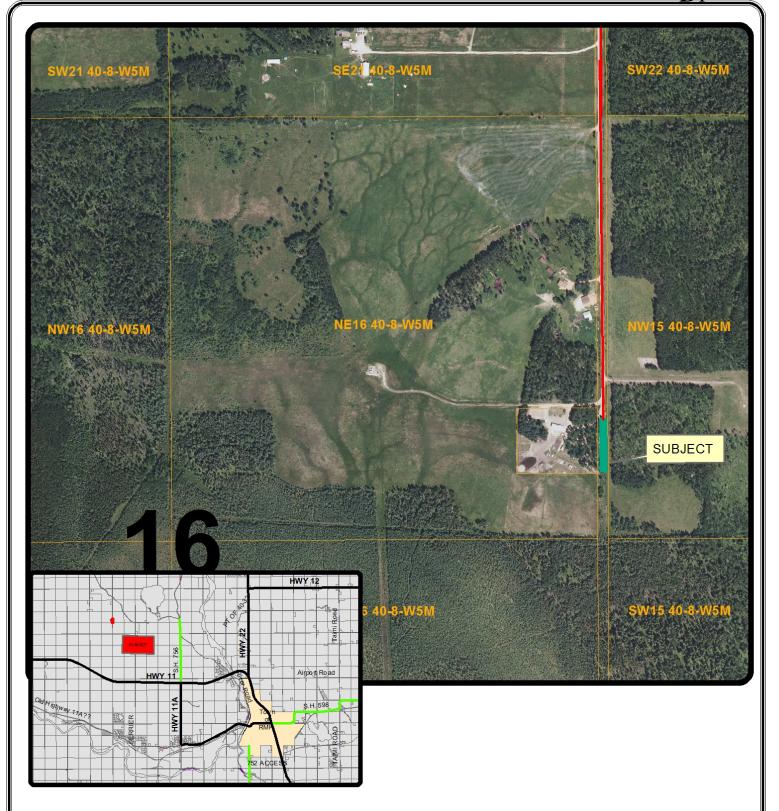

Background:			

Landcare

We have received the results from last summer's riparian health assessments in the Medicine River Watershed. Staff is currently going through the report but the preliminary information is very positive. The same sites were assessed in 2004, and there are significant improvements noted in comparison to last summer's assessment. The complete report will be available on our website after the wrap up phase of the project is completed. The 2012 assessments were funded through an Alberta Stewardship Network Grant with matching funding from Cows and Fish who were contracted to complete the work. We have received another grant to complete more riparian health assessments in 2013 within the Prairie Creek watershed. This spring we are planning on running hard wood cutting trials to assess the value and viability of planting native aspen and willow species from cuttings. This information will be helpful for both landcare and vegetation management programs.

Vegetation Management

Spring Brushing is underway as well as well as the first notifications for the long term brushing plan as outlined in our new brushing policy. Along with these notifications significant awareness efforts have and will continue to be undertaken to inform the public of the new brushing policy utilizing our website, the local newspapers and our county newsletter.



Agricultural Programs

We are approaching our busy time for weed and pest programs, and staff is busy preparing. A significant overhaul of our Custom Spraying equipment, including the sprayers and water truck, is currently underway which will make the equipment safer and more efficient. Staff has also completed the construction of a new community pasture sprayer bringing the fleet to six units. The new sprayer will be located in the James River community. This unit will fill a large gap in access for James River residents as well take significant pressure off of the Caroline sprayer making it more accessible to that community.

The public will then have sixty (60) days after mailing to submit appeals pertaining to the assessed value, ending the appeal period approximately on July 17, 2013.

Background: On April 4th Martin Buckley (CAO – M.D. Bighorn) and I discussed our Councils' upcoming meeting. We wish to recommend the following as topics for discussion during that meeting:

- 1) Update on the CAO meeting with the Assistant Deputy Ministers of: ESRD, Solicitor General and, Tourism, Parks & Recreation, As Council is aware the CAOs from Yellowhead County, M.D. of Bighorn and Clearwater County met on April 5 with three of the ADMs from the above noted Provincial Ministries. Martin and I will provide a summary of our discussions and the anticipated direction of the three departments in relation to management of recreational use on crown land.
- Martin and I discussed some of the impacts that certain provincial policies are having on

municipal operations (e.g. requirements for obtaining crown leases, environmental assessments on road disturbances within road allowances within crown properties, etc.) and believe there is value in exchanging information on how we are separately being impacted and discuss whether there is merit in jointly requesting clarification or, potentially, lobbying provincial departments together or submitting a resolution for consideration by the AAMDC membership.

Background:

Background:

In 2002 Council approved a resolution to make application to the Solicitor General Department for the Community Peace officers to carry shotguns in their vehicles for animal disposal complaints within the County.

The attached policy was approved by Council in October of 2002 and to date has not been enacted within the Community Peace Officer program.

At this time staff would like to request that this policy be rescinded by Council as it is not the intention of staff to pursue the use of firearms at this time.

Clearwater County

USE OF FIREARMS

EFFECTIVE DATE: October 2002

SECTION: Public Works

POLICY STATEMENT:

The Council of Clearwater County recognizes the need for Special Constables to carry firearms in the County vehicles while on duty for the purpose of using these firearms in situations such as putting down an animal which has been badly injured and rendered helpless and should be destroyed.

County Council approved a resolution at its meeting held August 13, 2002 to make application to the Alberta Solicitor General to permit the Constabulary to carry firearms in their vehicles to be used primarily for animal control and associated humane reasons.

Clearwater County shall maintain a Firearms Purchase and Acquisition Certificate under the Canadian Firearms Act.

PROCEDURE:

- 1. The County may issue a firearm and ammunition to Special Constables (employee) who may be required to destroy dangerous or injured animals.
 - a) The firearm is of the 5.56 mm caliber.
 - b) The firearm has been inspected and approved by a certified Gunsmith.
 - c) The firearm shall meet provincial standards.
 - d) The employee is eligible to be issued a firearm.
- 2. The issue of any firearm to an employee is conditional upon:
 - a) Satisfactorily completing a training course approved by the Solicitor General's Department;
 - b) The Special Constable successfully qualifying for the use of the firearm in accordance with this policy.
 - c) Approval from the Law Enforcement Division of the Solicitor General's Department.

AMMUNITION:

- 3. No ammunition other that factory load ammunition shall be used by employees during the course of their duties.
- 4. The Special Constables will be responsible to ensure that there is on hand in the department, at all times, a stock of ammunition adequate to meet training and operational requirements.

STORAGE, HANDLING AND TRANSPORTATION:

Storage, handling and transportation shall comply with the Federal Firearms Act and Alberta Provincial Law Enforcement Standards.

- 5. When firearms and/or ammunition are in the office:
 - a) Firearms will be stored in a locked cabinet or room;
 - b) Ammunition will be stored in a locked cabinet or room separate from the firearms.
- 6. When firearms and/or ammunition are transported in a vehicle they shall be stored within an approved locking device complying with Alberta Provincial Law Enforcement Standards for transportation.

INSPECTION:

- 7. Whoever inspects a Special Constable firearm shall be qualified and meet the requirements of the Firearms Act.
- 8. The Director of Public Works will arrange for the annual inspection of all firearms being utilized.
 - a) All firearms shall be maintained according to the Provincial Law Enforcement Standards.
 - b) Inspection will be conducted to determine whether or not the firearm is being maintained in a safe, clean and serviceable manner.
 - c) Following inspection, the condition and the apparent manner of maintenance of the firearm shall be recorded.
 - d) Special Constables will inspect each others firearm. The Public Works Director may direct to have a qualified gun smith perform the inspection.
 - e) Such inspections maybe called more often as directed by the Public Works Director.

REPORT OF DISCHARGES:

- 9. Any Special Constable who discharges a firearm while on duty shall;
 - a) Complete a standard occurrence report outlining the circumstances under which the firearm was used.
 - b) Report all discharges other than training to the primary police agency in Clearwater County.
 - c) Document in diary when the firearm is removed from the vehicle securing device, but not discharged, other than for servicing/maintenance of the firearm or vehicle and being removed for alternate storage. (i.e.: removed from vehicle storage and moved to office storage and vice versa)

RECALL OF FIREARMS:

- 10. An issued firearm may be removed from an employee's possession when:
 - a) The employee is found to have used a firearm in a manner which is irresponsible or unsafe:
 - b) An inspection of his/her firearm reveals that it is not being maintained in a safe, clean and serviceable manner.
- 11. When a firearm has been removed from an employee's possession, as per Section 10, the firearm will not be returned to him/her until the circumstances which resulted in such action being taken have been reviewed by the Review Panel made up of the CAO and the Director of Public Works.
 - a) Upon reviewing the circumstances of a particular case, the Panel shall decide for or against the re-issue of the firearm.
 - b) The Panel may implement conditions which must be met by the employee before a firearm is re-issued.

QUALIFICATION:

12. All County employed Special Constables will be required to undergo annual firearm testing in accordance to a standard approved by the Solicitor General.

Background: The Province of Alberta through the Alberta Sport, Recreation, Parks and Wildlife Foundation has provided a Municipal Recreation/Tourism Areas (MR/TA) grant program since 1981. The grant is designed to provide funding for the maintenance and operations of campgrounds and was initially designed to be available to a recipient campground for 25 years from the first date of funding.

Clearwater County has historically received this grant funding from the Province on behalf of the Cow Lake, Burnstick Lake and Open Creek Dam campgrounds. Clearwater County holds the recreation leases, and applies on the campground's behalf. Each campground has received annual Provincial grant funding in the amount of \$8,000.00. Open Creek Dam and Burnstick Lake campgrounds had reached their 25 year term limit several years ago, but the Province had continued providing annual funding to them. Cow Lake—the third campground, will be reaching their 25 year term limit in 2013.

Clearwater County administration has been advised that the Province's funding for the Alberta Sport, Recreation, Parks and Wildlife Foundation was decreased by \$2 million in the 2013 Provincial budget. As a result, the Foundation will no longer provide MR/TA grant funding for campgrounds that have reached their 25 year milestone. Therefore, the three campgrounds that Clearwater County has previously applied for funding for will no longer receive annual funding from this source. Representatives from the three campgrounds have been advised and were asked to submit their final grant reporting documents to satisfy the Province's grant reporting requirements.

Staff will continue to provide Council with impacts of the Provincial budget as they become known.

Background:

On April 4th, 2013 Clearwater County jointly hosted a tabletop exercise with ESRD. The simulated event was a large wild land fire in the Ferrier area. This simulated event grew out of control and burned in a south-east direction threatening the Town of Rocky Mountain House and crossing the river into the Cow Lake area. In addition to the ESRD Fire Control Centre participating, the County activated our own Emergency Operations Centre and the ASB Meeting room was utilized to simulate a separate Incident Command Post.

The event was designed to test both County and ESRD emergency response plans as well as focus on how well participants were able to communicate and collaborate to deal with the event. Participants in the event included:
