Ted Hickey presented a draft Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between Clearwater County and Rocky Mountain House Search and Rescue (SAR) for the integration of SAR within Clearwater County's Community and Protective Services (CCCPS) Department. He noted that the intent of the MOU is to remaining as a response agency under the direction of the RCMP and not a county provided service. provide SAR with operational and capital support while maintaining SAR's
